My name is Kathy Wright, I have owned dogs for over 25 years. I show and do obedience with my dogs and am a member of two local training clubs.

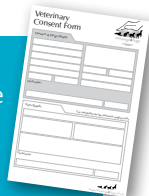
I developed a interest in massage when one of my own dogs ruptured a cruciate ligament which threatened an end to his show career.

What is Canine Massage?



Canine Massage is a complementary therapy which has a positive influence on both the physical and psychological well-being of dogs.

How can massage benefit my dog?

Canine Massage is a complementary therapy which has a positive influence on both the physical and psychological well-being of dogs.

It can benefit your dog by:

- Improving connective tissue and increase joint mobility
- Encouraging flexibility and range of movement in joints
- Helping to reduce muscular tension and soreness
- Helping to reduce swelling and excessive scar tissue and aid recovery
- Easing muscle spasm and muscular pain
- Warming up muscles pre-exercise
- Encouraging relaxation by regulating the heart beat and respiratory rate
- Enhancing circulatory blood circulation and lymph drainage

Why does my dog need a massage?

If any of the following sound familiar and you answer yes to any of the points listed, then your dog could benefit from a treatment of massage.

- Is your dog hyperactive?
- Does it have behavioral problems?
- Is your dog nervous, anxious or suffer from stress?
- Is your dog elderly or getting stiff?
- Does your dog have mobility problems?
- Is your dog recovering from illness or injury?
- Does your dog have musculoskeletal problems?
- Has your dog recently had surgery?
- Is your dog a large breed?
- Is your dog a working dog?
- Is your dog a competitive athlete (obedience/agility/fly ball/racing etc)
